
Free Verse

Free Verse simply flows. It does not have a particular pattern. It may have some rhyming phrases or none at all. However, it always expresses an idea or a story or an impression in a rhythmic form.



Suggestions:

Just begin thinking of what you are interested in, what you are happy or sad about, what you are concerned about. What questions do you have about life? What are you mad about? Think of the future and ideas you have, think about the past and see what comes to mind. Try to remember especially good times in your life, especially difficult times. Put those feelings into words.

When writing free verse poetry, be especially concerned with the placement of the words on each line. A very short free verse will probably be placed on two, three, or four lines to emphasize the beauty of the ideas expressed. If the poem is longer, then the lines too will be longer. However, be sure the words are placed so that the writing appears to be a poem and not a short story or simply a paragraph. Free verse depends so much on the careful choice of words or phrases so be ready to reedit until you are pleased with the poem.

Inside — Outside Poetry

Inside — Outside Poetry first describes someone as the person he or she thinks other people might see, focusing on those things which they don't especially like. The second two stanzas then describe the person as the perfect boy of girl of their dreams. The rhyming pattern is ABCB.

Mother's Day Poetry

Mother's Day Poetry (or Father's Day Poetry or Birthday Poetry for someone special) has five stanzas. Each stanza describes a different feeling, or part of the person's life. It concludes with a special wish or final remark. The rhyme pattern is ABCB.



Suggestions:

Suggestions:



Suggestions:

Color poetry can be written in many different ways. For example: The lines could begin with, "I like blue" followed by "The color of friendship that is true." The lines could begin with "Blue is the sky" followed by a stanza such as "Birds fly there high." Each stanza could be a free verse such as, "Blue eyes of a baby make grown men smile." The rhyming pattern could be ABCB. However you write it, try to make each line special with interesting words, unique ideas, or by the way the words are organized on the page.
